CASE STUDY: BOND AGGREGATOR



In the 2017–18 Federal Budget, Treasurer Scott Morrison announced the creation of an affordable housing bond aggregator, the National Housing Finance and Investment Corporation (NHFIC), to raise money at lower rates from the wholesale bond market for not-for-profit community housing providers.

The NHFIC is informed by AHURI research into bond aggregator models presented in a report from the Affordable

Housing Working Group to Federal, state and territory Treasurers as part of the Council on Federal Financial Relations in late 2016. The final details of the NHFIC will be determined following advice from the Affordable Housing Implementation Taskforce, with the Corporation to commence operations on 1 July 2018.



RESEARCH ON STRATEGIC POLICY ISSUES

AHURI research is delivered through a suite of Evidence-Based Policy Inquiries, which focus on strategic priorities for national housing, homelessness and urban issues. AHURI facilitates regular and active engagement with key stakeholders in the development of research priorities, and in the research process through participation of senior government officials on AHURI Inquiry panels. In 2016-17, four Inquiries were completed:



Property transfer methodologies



Affordable housing industry capacity



Housing policies, labour force participation and economic growth



Funding and delivery of programs to reduce homelessness

RESEARCH PUBLISHED

AHURI's Evidence-Based Policy Inquiries culminate in the publishing of peer-reviewed research reports on the AHURI website. In 2016-17 AHURI published 21 new research reports and its reports were viewed over 82,000 times.



CASE STUDY: TREASURER'S ADDRESS

Federal Treasurer Scott Morrison delivered a pre-budget address on housing affordability hosted by AHURI at the State Library in Melbourne on Monday 10 April. The speech focused not only on affordability challenges to do with home ownership, but also the difficulties faced by Australians in the rental market, particularly those in social and affordable housing. The event was attended by 200 delegates and was extensively covered by media, including being broadcast live on ABC News 24.
