## CASE STUDY: AHURI develops integrated understanding of mental health, housing and homelessness support systems



AHURI's Professional Services team was commissioned for two substantial research projects that helped develop new understandings of the complex relationship between mental health, housing and homelessness. The first project, undertaken for the National Mental Health Commission, provided evidence on Australia's housing and mental health support systems and the integration required to provide more and better housing services for people with lived experience of mental ill health.

The second project, Trajectories, is a national study currently underway in partnership with Mind Australia. Through nationwide consultations and evidence building, the project is mapping the mental health pathways of people with lived experience of mental ill health, the interaction of these pathways, and the potential points of intervention identified through this understanding.






## Engagement

AHURI's public engagement in 2018-19 featured the relaunching of the National Homelessness Conference in partnership with Homelessness Australia—a two day summit that brought together homelessness support providers, policy makers, and those with lived experience to focus on ending homelessness in Australia. AHURI also expanded its event programming in 2018-19 with the introduction of the AHURI Discussion Series—90 minute panel discussions based around the latest research, held in a number of cities around Australia.

#### CASE STUDY: AHURI leads international study tour to Canada



The AHURI international study tour provided an immersive opportunity for Australian housing policy makers and researchers to learn from Canada's policy and practice reforms. Canada's similar federated government structure, housing system and Indigenous housing challenges provides interesting parallels and lessons for Australian housing and homelessness policy development. Study tour participants attended briefings from senior government and community sector representatives across Canada. The connections forged have helped foster ongoing international links with leading housing policy officials.



# DEVELOPING POLICY RESPONSES FOR AUSTRALIA'S GROWING CITIES

Australia is a highly urbanised country, and the great economic growth of our cities has seen an increased demand for infrastructure, transport and housing. As our cities continue to grow, there is a critical need for an evidence-base to underpin policy responses at all levels of government. In 2018–19, AHURI strengthened its commitment to cities research and policy, releasing a new Strategic Plan, including the AHURI Cities Research Agenda, featuring five inaugural research projects.
