About Housing for the Aged Action Group

- > Community organisation with over 600 members, mainly from Victoria, increasingly Australia-wide
- Our "Home at Last" Service (based in Victoria)
 - > Information, referral and outreach service for people aged 50 years+ who are experiencing or at risk of homelessness
 - Aged Care System Navigator
 - > Early intervention and prevention
- National advocacy National Alliance of Seniors for Housing (NASH) focus on influencing decisionmakers to address housing for older people and combatting ageism

Our Older LGBTI Housing project

Summary of our work to date:

- > Steering Committee comprising of LGBTI organisations with a focus on older people
- > Report: "Out of the Closet, Out of Options: Older LGBTI people at risk of homelessness" August 2020
- Joint advocacy with our partners
- July 2021, we achieved Rainbow Tick accreditation, only the second homelessness service in Australia to achieve this milestone
- Community reference group 11 older members of the LGBTI community meet regularly to inform our work




What research is out there?


AAG Rapid Evidence Assessment: LGBTI Ageing Research on Housing Needs and Preferences (Dr Sandra South and Tonye Szebedecki)

- Academic and grey literature about LGBTI people and ageing between 2008-2018
- Only four Australian & NZ publications, main types were opinion pieces, descriptive studies and explorations of relationships
- > Lesbian, gay and bisexual people were the most commonly studied; very few Trans and Gender Diverse
- Housing: topics were research issues, discrimination and LGBTI-specific needs
- Xey message: High quality research evidence is needed to show what works and does not work to meet older LGBTI people's housing needs and preferences




Research Findings: Who we surveyed (228 people)






Percentage of Respondents: LGBTI Status



Housing Tenure






Research Findings: Results

Self-reported levels of homelessness higher than general population:

- > 40% of participants have experienced homelessness
- 16 % currently at risk of homelessness.

Risk Factors

- Low rates of homeownership
- Living in Private rental
- Living alone
- Living with a Disability and in caring roles:
- Living in unconventional housing arrangements
- Don't know where to go for help or what support services are available

Key messages to engage with older LGBTI people


Informed by our LGBTI community reference group

- > Building trust and show cultural safety be aware of historical discrimination
- Reaching people who are not "out"
- Understanding risk factors
- Addressing internal ageism
- Destigmatise the issue
- "Older LGBTI people's pathway to homelessness is not an individual issue, it is a consequence of long-term systemic issues"



Challenges

- Funding we have struggled to find funding for this project, and have relied on small grants and donations.
- Lack of affordable housing appropriate for older LGBTI people
- LGBTIQ+ sector is youth-focused; aged care system and homelessness system is not necessarily culturally safe for older LGBTI people (although this is improving)
