### Research on strategic policy issues

AHURI's flagship National Housing Research Program and developing National Cities Research Program delivered a momentous 26 peer reviewed research reports in this financial year, including a priority research project on Australia's COVID-19 pandemic housing policy responses.


# **EVENTS**

### **2022 National Housing Conference**

Melbourne, 2-4 March

The 2022 National Housing Conference (NHC), delayed by six months and moved 1600 kilometres from its planned location in Brisbane due to the COVID-19 pandemic, made a triumphant return to Melbourne in March. 144 speakers from Australia and abroad and 1300 delegates (over 800 in the room and almost 500 online) from a broad range of sectors came together to learn the lessons for the housing sector from the pandemic and other external challenges, and importantly, to re-connect with friends and colleagues, old and new.

AHURI's first attempt with this hybrid experience proved to be successful with a broader audience and an increase in delegate numbers from 2019, despite the challenges of COVID-19.



#### **AHURI Webinar Series**

Introduced in early 2020, AHURI's Research Webinar Series was consolidated as a popular forum for audiences to engage with the latest research findings. The regular forum supported a 20-minute presentation by the lead author of a newly published piece of AHURI research, followed by response from an industry representative. Additionally, each webinar included a facilitated panel discussion and opportunity for audience members to submit questions to presenters via the webinar platform for an interactive experience.

In May 2022, AHURI launched the Cities Webinar Series with the event, 'Driving population growth in regional cities'. This series examines some of the major cities and urban policy issues in Australia, and closely aligned with our 12 cities and urban themes.

# **ENGAGEMENT**

#### Research impact

The AHURI Final Report series is ranked as Australia's most impactful journal or publication series in public administration, urban studies and development, and the nation's fourth most impactful series across the social sciences (according to SCImago Journal Ranks). The reports rank in the top quartile of urban studies and development publications globally.

#### **Professional Services**

AHURI's Professional Services team continued to provide tailored research solutions for clients across government, private and community sectors, playing an important role in supporting policy development for a number of significant clients.

In the 2021-2022 year, highlights included:

- Common ground Practice Manual In collaboration with Mind Australia and MGS Architects, AHURI developed a Common Ground Practice Manual to provide guidance for the delivery, design and funding of congregate supportive housing based on Housing First principles, such as the Common Ground model. This work involved extensive engagement with multiple stakeholders, and has created a resource being used by local governments, in partnership with state agencies, for the delivery of congregate supportive housing.
- NSW homelessness industry partnership Homelessness NSW engaged AHURI to undertake an evaluation of the NSW Homelessness Industry and Workforce Development Strategy (2017-2020). The evaluation, through a mix of quantitative and qualitative methods, produced a range of recommendations that are being considered in the development of future strategies.



#### International leadership

AHURI's continuing international engagements were featured at the National Housing Conference in March 2022, including a keynote address from Adrianne Todman, Deputy Secretary of the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), as well as international addresses from Japan, the Netherlands, and Austria.
