



# Our impact in 2024-25



Housing, homelessness and urban planning issues continued to dominate the public discourse in 2024–25. Governments, community and industry players across Australia

grappled with high construction costs, workforce shortages and long social housing waiting lists.

Housing was a central policy issue in the May 2025 Federal election, which saw strong media demand for AHURI analysis. Our research was increasingly cited by media, ensuring much of the public debate was underpinned by the latest evidence.

In 2024–25, AHURI published a number of timely research reports addressing issues, including the growth of long-term renting, the state of building quality in Australia, and the real affordability of housing beyond the rent or mortgage price alone. Our two Inquiries provided fresh evidence to support much needed generational investment in social housing, and to assist governments and industry to match supply of new homes to population growth.

Our Professional Services team provided expert advice and research support to a range of clients. Highlights included creating a measurement framework to monitor anticipated displacement in South East Queensland ahead of the Brisbane 2032 Olympics and Paralympics, as well as curating an informative exhibition showcasing innovative public housing design.

The Australian Homelessness Conference, convened by AHURI with the South Australia Government as host state partner, again attracted a strong national audience, collaborating with the shared goal of ending homelessness. AHURI webinars examining topics including forever renting and Australian building quality enjoyed increasing popularity over the year, with most reaching full capacity.

We were delighted to welcome Queensland University of Technology on board as a new research partner. Our strong national research network, longstanding partnerships with federal and state/territory governments, and sector engagement underpin our mission to deliver high quality evidence to improve housing and urban outcomes for all Australians.

## **Policy advice**

AHURI representatives sit on more than 18 ministerial, government and public sector advisory bodies providing direct policy advice to Federal, state and territory Ministers, agencies and sector leadership bodies. This includes the National Urban Policy Forum (Federal Minister for Cities), Housing Supply Expert Panel (Queensland Minister for Housing), and the Ministerial Homelessness Reform Advisory Group (Victorian Minister for Housing and Homelessness).

As well as providing direct advice to key policy decision makers, AHURI also contributed submissions and testimony to a range of government Inquiries, including:

- the Federal Government's Senate Economics Legislation Committee's inquiry into Help to Buy
- the Parliament of South Australia's Select Committee on Short Stay Accommodation Sector
- the Victorian Legislative Assembly Environment and Planning Committee's Inquiry into the supply of homes in regional Victoria
- the Victorian Parliament's Select Committee on Victoria Planning Provisions Amendments.

**Final Inquiry Reports** 

#### Inquiry into socially supported housing pathways

Four research projects conducted as part of this Inquiry examined how to change Australia's housing assistance system into one that supports 'housing pathways'. The Final Report offered options for how governments could reimagine the social housing system and transform social housing assistance.

# Inquiry into projecting Australia's urban and regional futures: population dynamics, regional mobility and planning responses

This research Inquiry investigated ways to predict and support local population growth and change, and what drives people to move between urban and regional Australia. The Final Report explored what this migration means for planning infrastructure and housing.

### **National Cities Research Program**

AHURI's self-funded investment in a National Cities Research Program delivered its fifth report in 2024–25.

### Voicing First Nations Country, culture and community in urban policy

The research found current approaches to engaging First Nations peoples in urban policy and planning are placing an unreasonable and unsustainable burden on Traditional Custodians. It argued a change of relationship with First Nation Traditional Custodians and a rethinking of current engagement approaches could create a more responsible process.

# **Professional Services**

AHURI's consulting team worked closely with governments and the not-for-profit and community sectors to provide evidence for policy impact and evaluation.

## **Program evaluation**

AHURI Professional Services undertook several evaluations in 2024–25.

- The Community Housing Futures Program aims to enhance the capacity and capability of community housing providers in Queensland. AHURI completed an evaluation of the program for Q Shelter in 2025.
- Make Room provides secure supportive housing for people experiencing rough sleeping or chronic homelessness in the City of Melbourne. AHURI's evaluation of Make Room is assessing the impact of the project for residents, the community and neighbourhood. The first phase was delivered in 2025, with the next phase commencing in 2026.
- The Interim Evaluation of the Foyer Central in Sydney for Uniting NSW assessed the model and practice approach to evaluate its effectiveness and improve outcomes for young people and inform ongoing practice development.
- Policy evidence and advisory services

This year, AHURI Professional Services delivered several projects to support important policy and strategic initiatives. Highlights include the following.

- The South East Queensland Displacement Monitoring project for QShelter developed a framework to measure potential displacement in South East Queensland, caused by anticipated changes in housing market conditions leading up to the Brisbane 2032 Olympic and Paralympic Games. Monitoring will continue annually to 2032.
- Professional Services worked closely with Uniting Vic.Tas to develop a feasibility study and manual for Youth Housing First models in Victoria's Central Highlands Area.
- Together with Equity Economics, Professional Services undertook a rapid review of youth housing and homelessness programs and services to support the Australian Government Department of Social Services policy development processes.

### **Urban design**

Funded by the Alistair Swayn Foundation, and delivered by AHURI Professional Services,
 Designing Australia's Public Housing is an exhibition and research project that examines a century of innovation and leadership in Australia's public housing design. The report showcases new ideas in urban form, experiments with density, and innovations in construction that were a feature of twentieth century public housing provision. It identifies principles to help guide investment and
